It is my pleasure to acknowledge the many accomplishments and hard working officers of the Manchester Police Department as evidence throughout the 2019 annual report. I remain extremely proud to lead officers with the highest ethical and professional standards who are committed to making Manchester a place all can live safely and without fear. The Manchester Police Department is working for you as we reduce the levels of crime, fear and disorder through community based, problem-oriented driven policing.

The 2019 annual report is indicative of the many activities of the Manchester Police Department as well as criminal and traffic statistics. With confidence it will provide a clear understanding of the department and the effort put forth by the agency to protect the citizens of Manchester.

The Tennessee Highway Safety Office Grant, administered by Capt. Chris Patterson, is used to provide funding for extra traffic enforcement during NHTSA enforcement events. For the 2019-2020 grant year, the agency received \$23,000.00 to fund overtime hours and equipment. Our agency also received grant funds for body armor through the Dept. of Justice (BVP).

During 2019, Antonio Frost & Brandon Tomberlin were awarded with Officer of the Year "Patriot Day" and Jamie Norris was awarded the Cumberland Region Officer of the Year through the Tn. Highway Safety Office.

The Manchester Police Department also gained two new dual purpose K-9s. Two Belgian Malinois dogs were hand selected from Europe by Nashville K-9. Officer Daryn Gaden and Officer Derek Bowles were selected as the two handlers. They completed 10 weeks of training in December at Nashville K-9. We welcomed K-9 Nalty and K-9 Storm to Manchester Police Department.

The Manchester Police Department also continues its partnership with the Manchester City Schools. A School Resource Officer is placed in each city school.

Our agency has continued to work closely with other agencies including the THSO, THP, Coffee County Sheriff's Department, TBI, District Attorney General's Office and all other state and federal agencies. The Manchester Police Department had a successful 2019. I intend that this report will display each year our department's obligation in order to keep Manchester a safe place to visit and call home.

MISSION STATEMENT

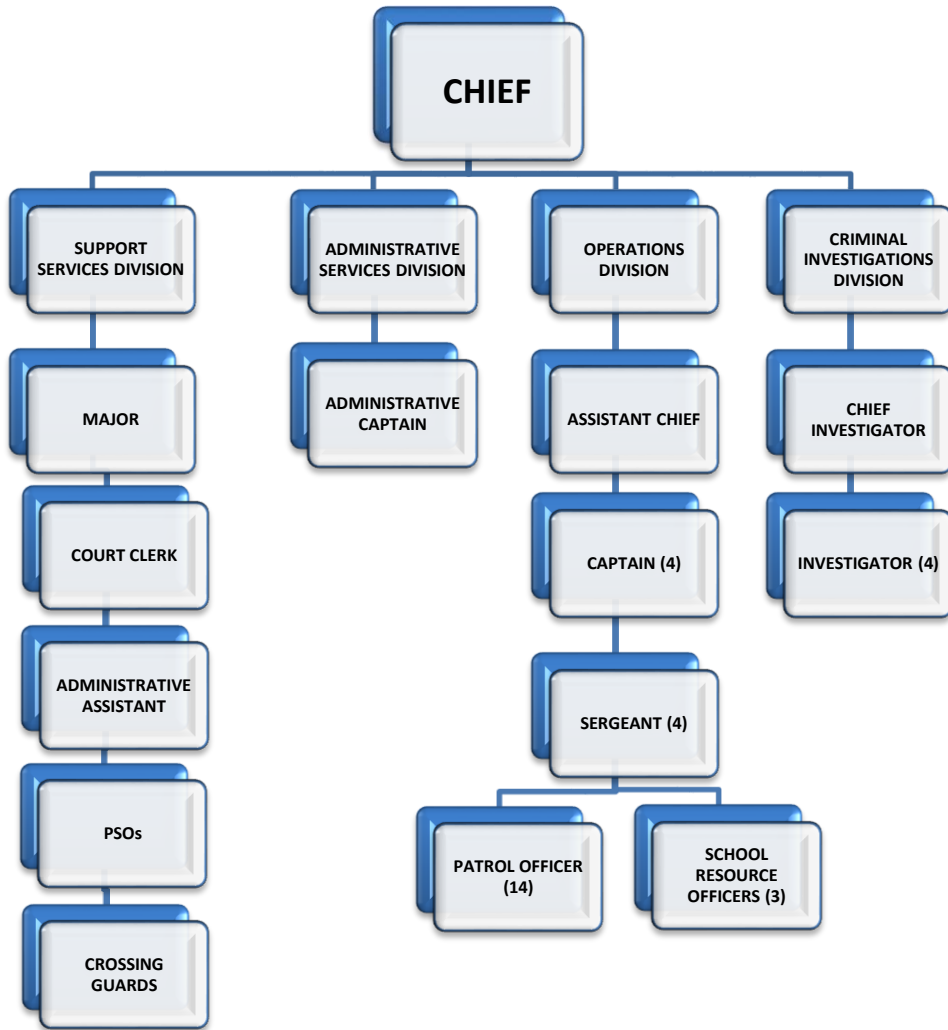

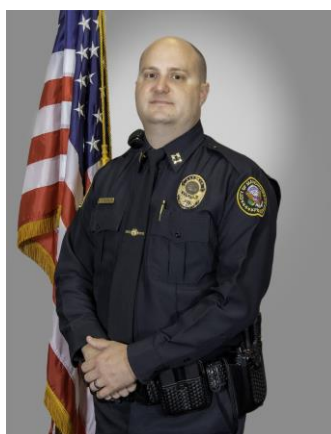

SUPPORT SERVICES

The Manchester Police Department Support Services is under the direction of Major Bill Sipe. Major Sipe also serves as a liaison with the Operations Division (Patrol). The support services staff is responsible for providing friendly customer service to the public and citizens of Manchester. The Public Service Officers are the first line of contact inside the police department. They are responsible for assisting the public by taking basic reports, providing copies of incident / crash reports and collecting fines for traffic citations.

The court clerk is responsible for all traffic citations issued. They are entered into the computer system and are arranged for traffic court. The court clerk is also responsible for all traffic citations being sent to the state.

The administrative assistant is responsible for a variety of tasks that support the operation of the department including but not limited to all TIBRS reporting to the TBI and beer permit applications.

The Manchester Police Department employs five crossing guards in the support services division to direct/assist with traffic at our city schools and Coffee County Central High School.

Our staff is always willing and ready to assist the public in any way it can.

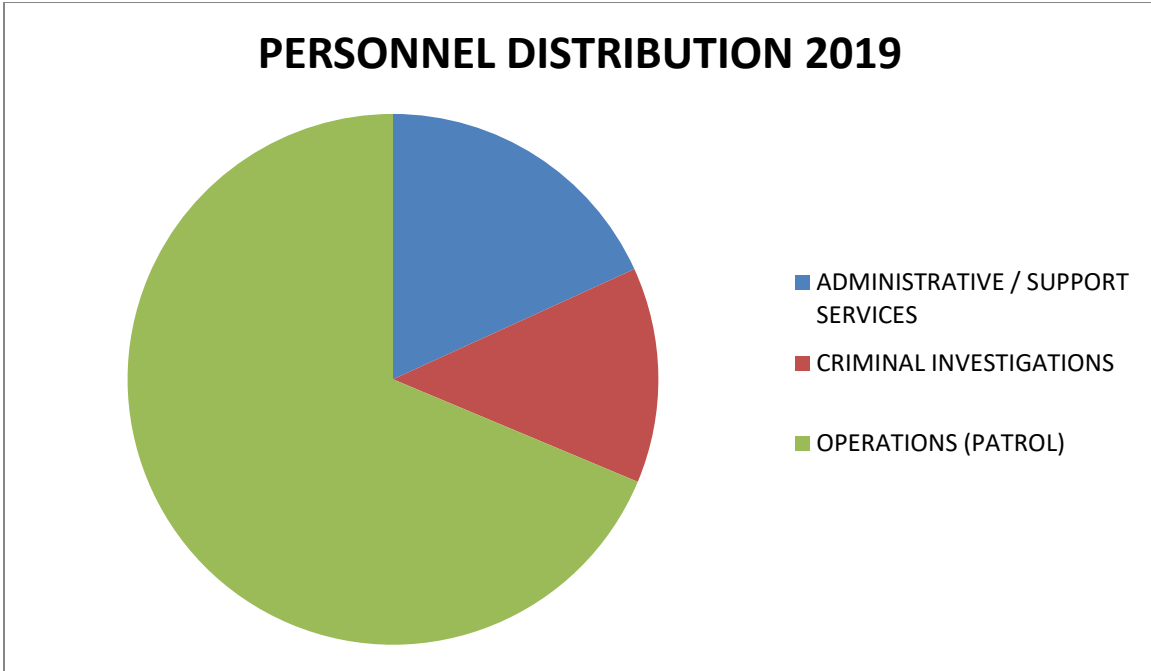

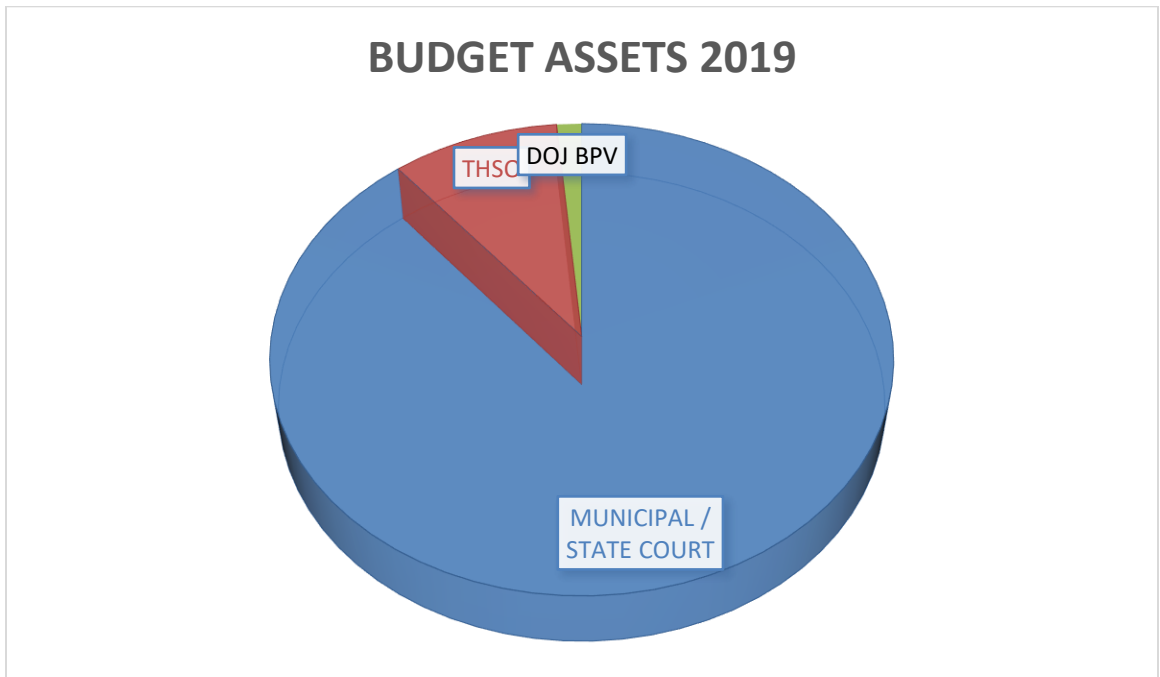

OPERATIONS (PATROL) DIVISION

The Manchester Police Department patrol division is divided into four shifts, each of which is commanded by a shift Captain. The shift Captain serves as commander to a shift Sergeant and four patrol officers. The patrol Captain reports directly to the Assistant Chief. The patrol division works 12 hour shifts. Ending 2019, there were a total of 22 positions in the patrol division. The patrol division provides 24 hour per day service to the City of Manchester. The Operations (Patrol) Division is under the direction of the Assistant Chief.

The School Resource Officers also fall under the Operations Division and the direct supervision of the Assistant Chief. There are 3 School Resources which includes one at each city school.

Officers assigned to patrol respond to initial calls for service, complete incident reports, work traffic accidents, provide traffic enforcement, make necessary arrests and work numerous community oriented events. The patrol division also participates in all enforcement events and works closely with the Tennessee Highway Safety Office. All THSO events and enforcements are managed by the Administrative Captain.

OPERATIONS (PATROL) DIVISION DISTRIBUTION

The Manchester Police Department patrol division consists of 22 personnel. These personnel are distributed in the following order: 4 shift Captains, 4 shift Sergeants, 14 patrol officers.

Each officer works 80 hours in a two week pay period or 2,080 hours per year. The total hours does not include overtime or lost time calculated from city benefits (sick time, vacation time).

Summary

During 2019, the department answered 16,977 calls for service, which reflects an increase of .57% from 2018. The patrol division constantly strives to keep the roadways as safe as possible. In 2019, the Manchester Police Department issued 685 speeding citations, 161 seatbelt citations, 1,025 no insurance citations, 2,270 citations for other traffic violations and made 76 DUI arrests. The police department worked 436 crashes in 2019. The police department continues to team up with the Tennessee Highway Safety Office to detect and deter impaired drivers, specifically alcohol related.

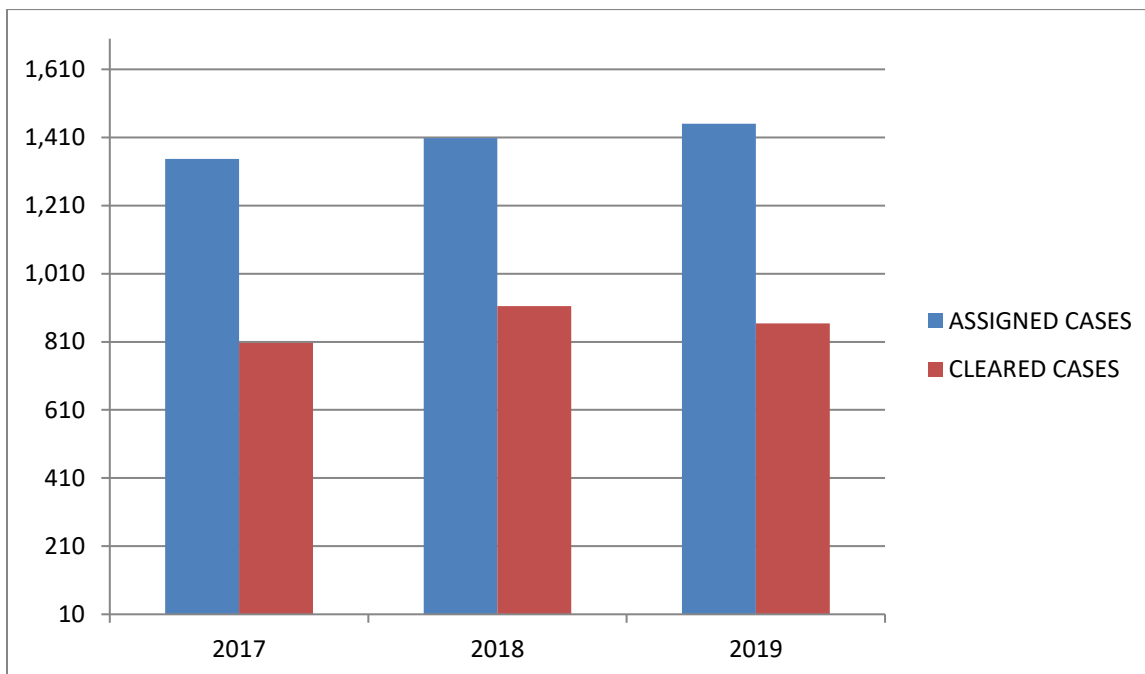

The Criminal Investigation Division (CID) is responsible for following up and investigating all crimes that occur within the city of Manchester. CID investigates cases that patrol does not solve along with all major crimes. CID also processes crime scenes along with collecting and preserving evidence. The division also participates in task forces and works with other agencies to fight drug crimes. Registering and maintaining of sex offenders is also managed by the Criminal Investigation Division.

CID also works closely with the TBI, FBI and Coffee County Sheriff's Department making numerous drug arrests and drug seizures throughout the year including Bonnaroo.

MANCHESTER POLICE DEPARTMENT TRAINING 2019

Officers at the Manchester Police Department must attend 40 hours of In-service training each year to remain in compliance with the Peace Officers Standards and Training. The 40 hours can be combined with general In-service hours along with specialized training. There are required courses that must be implemented during the 40 hours. The officers at Manchester Police Department completed 1561.5 hours of specialized training in 2019. Every officer completed at least 40 hours of POST required training. Most officers completed more than the required 40 hours.
